A nature lover's wonderland


The 100 million-year-old UNESCO World Heritage listed Wet Tropics Rainforest is right on the doorstep of Cairns. Take an easy walk or long hike and explore the rich and unique biodiversity within this 894,420 hectare wonder

Closer to town, the Cairns Botanic gardens is a lovely place to relax and unwind after class. The Cairns Regional Council provides residents with a range of sports grounds, walking and cycling tracks and free exercise classes.

A region buzzing with arts and culture

Take in a show at the Cairns Performing Arts Centre, Munro Martin Parklands or Tanks Arts Centre, eat out at the various cafes and restaurants, or check out one of the oceanside markets.

Explore the rich history of the world's oldest living culture at Tjapukai Aboriginal Cultural Park, or watch a traditional performance and explore new artworks at the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair.





Green Island on the Great Barrier Reef is a 45 minute ferry ride from Cairns.

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The campus location is spectacular – surrounded on three sides by rainforest covered mountains. Located near the northern beaches in the suburb of Smithfield, the campus is 15 kilometres (9 miles) north of the city centre. Study facilities can also be accessed at the JCU Cairns City campus.

JCU Cairns Campus

JCU Cairns houses teaching and research facilities, the JCU library, cafés, bars, fitness and sporting facilities.

Join the passionate local supporters of the North Queensland Cowboys Rugby League team, and take in a game at Townsville's newest 25,000 seat multi-purpose stadium.

Vibrant lifestyle

Visit 'The Strand', a 2.2km beachfront promenade in the heart of Townsville. Along this palm tree lined stretch are bike and walkway paths, safe swimming beaches, picturesque picnic spots, playgrounds, exercise stations, a water park and restaurants and bars with water views. Townsville offers an eclectic mix of cafes, restaurants, boutiques and bars, as well as fresh food markets.

Outdoor adventures

There are many stunning beaches within a short journey from the JCU campus. Grab a snorkel and explore the kaleidoscopic colours of the Great Barrier Reef or jump on a ferry and visit nearby Magnetic Island.

Castle Hill - a giant pink granite monolith - stands proud in the centre of Townsville and offers walking tracks which are frequented by more than 2,500 locals a day! The 360-degree views of Townsville at the top are well worth the journey.

Leading Hub for Marine Research

Townsville is renowned for marine research and is home of the headquarters of major marine research and management authorities including the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority, the Australian Institute of Marine Science, and the Australian Bureau of Meteorology.

The city is home to the world's largest living coral reef aquarium at Reef HQ Great Barrier Reef Aquarium - which boasts a 2.5 million litre exhibition, and a rehabilitation centre for sea turtles.



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JCU Townsville is set in a 386-hectare bush and parkland setting, approximately a 20-minute drive or 45-minute bus ride from the city centre. Study facilities can also be accessed at the JCU Townsville City campus.

JCU Townsville Campus

The campus is located in the Townsville Tropical Intelligence and Health Precinct in the suburb of Douglas, and set in a 386-hectare natural bush and parkland setting 13 kilometres (8 miles) from Townsville city centre.

Getting around

JCU Townsville houses teaching and research facilities, the main JCU library, cafés, bar, fitness and sporting facilities, a Multifaith Chaplaincy Centre. Around 1,200 students live on campus in colleges and halls of residence, giving the campus a true community atmosphere.

Places of worship

JCU's Multifaith Chaplaincy Centre is available as a free facility for you to practice your faith.

Medical

JCU students have access to a range of on-campus services including dental, medical, psychological, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech pathology and exercise physiology clinics. Nearby healthcare services include the Townsville University Hospital, located adjacent to the JCU campus providing 24 hour acute care.

On-campus convenience

Cairns and Townsville campuses both offer a range of food outlets for your coffee, snacking and lunch needs. Townsville campus also has a post office, pharmacy, medical centre, exercise facilities and hairdresser.

Getting around

JCU students can receive discounted public transport fares in Townsville and Cairns, and both campuses have easy access to public transportation links.

If you plan on driving in Australia ensure you check with your home institution on any restrictions regarding driving before you arrive and familiarise yourself with Australian road rules and licensing conditions.

For a sustainable transport solution, both campuses host the JCU Green Bike Fleet where students can purchase a refurbished bicycle for AUD\$50 and have the bicycle maintained by JCU's Team of bike mechanics free-of-charge. With sunshine for more than 300 days a year, and relatively flat terrain, riding a bike to class is one of the most popular forms of transport.

Clubs and societies

Clubs and societies play an active role in the University community by providing students with the opportunity to meet new people with common cultural, political, religious, sporting, recreation and academic interests. Gigs, social events, sports, academic workshops, market day, BBQs – whatever your interest is, we've got it covered.

Living on-campus

- Residences have security cameras and 24/7 security patrols
- JCU's on-campus security guards are available to escort you to your residence if you're studying on campus after hours
- Academic, wellbeing and social support services ensure you achieve your academic goals.

Townsville on-campus accommodation

Our Townsville campus provides on-campus accommodation options for up to 1,200 students. A vibrant community atmosphere on campus means you will make friends from all over the world while receiving support from peers and residential staff.

If you try new things and go to events, JCU will help give you heaps of life experiences, help you see the world through different perspectives, and help you make connections that you will cherish forever."





Orpheus Island Research Station

JCU's Orpheus Island Research Station is located 125km north of Townsville. Many subjects include field trips to the Island, which facilities include accommodation for up to 57 guests, wet and dry labs, temperature control room laboratories, and a range of boating, SCUBA diving and snorkelling equipment.

Daintree Rainforest Observatory

The Daintree Rainforest is the oldest rainforest in the world. It has the highest biodiversity of any ecosystem in Australia and is a magical landscape with unique biota, including numerous living fossils.


Completely off-grid, the Daintree Rainforest Observatory is the only field station in Australia operating a rainforest canopy crane, and is one of only five long-term ecological monitoring sites in Australia. Facilities include a lecture theatre, indoor and outdoor laboratories and

Wambiana Station

With an iconic landscape and unique environment, there's so much to discover in the Queensland outback at Wambiana station. Wambiana is a fully operational outback cattle station and its location in the dry Tropics and is ideal for our field courses because of the range of habitats

Habitats include healthy woodlands, dense thickets, a river, a lovely lagoon, and areas grazed at different densities. There is plenty of wildlife in all of these, including varied macropods (kangaroos, wallaroos, wallabies, bettongs), possums, marsupial carnivores, many species of birds, a very diverse array of reptiles (lizards, snakes, freshwater turtles), frogs, etc. Every year we record a long list, and every year we keep finding additional species on the property.

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How to apply

Study Periods

JCU has two main Study Periods each year which are each 13 weeks long.

- Semester 1 February-June
- Semester 2 July-November

Application deadlines

- Semester 1 30 January**
- Semester 2 30 June**

Choose your subjects

Study abroad and exchange students should avoid selecting subjects that run before the start of their chosen Study Period as it could create

At JCU most individual subjects have a value of 3 credit points. A normal full-time study load for a Study Period is four subjects or 12 credit points. The minimum allowable enrolment for study abroad students at JCU is three subjects or 9 credit points.

It is your responsibility to ensure that the subjects you wish to study at JCU are eligible for credit at your home institution.

You can study Level 1, 2 or 3 subjects if you meet the required subject prerequisites (if applicable). It is your responsibility to check you meet any prerequisites and academic and English language requirements. Browse subjects at jcu.edu.au/app/studyfinder

When you apply you should list between six to eight subjects (one semester) or 12 subjects (two semesters), and ensure the subjects are available in the Study Period you prefer (Study Period 1 or Study Period 2) and at the campus you are applying for.

Also check that the subjects are offered in the semester you plan to attend ICU, which campus the subjects are offered at (Cairns or Townsville), and that you have approval for your chosen subjects from your home institution.

We will assess your application based upon academic and English entry requirements for your preferred course. You will be advised of any additional documentation required.


