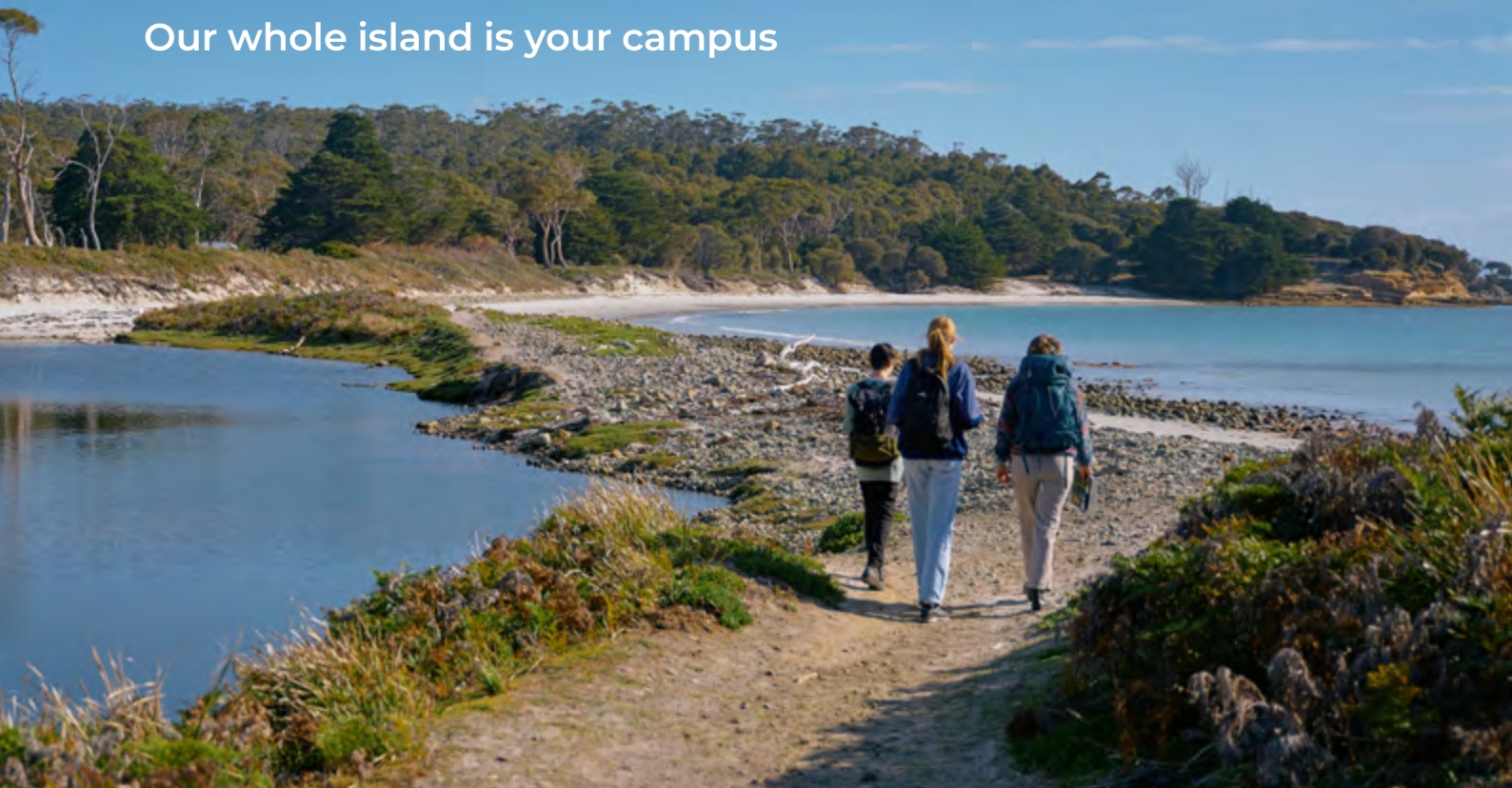

Our island

Heading South

Tasmania, Australia's only island state, is also the southernmost state and serves as a gateway to Antarctica. The island is renowned for its pristine air, clear skies, and breathtaking natural beauty.

Tasmania is affectionately referred to as 'Tassie' by the locals. Home to the famous Tasmanian Devil, Tassie is located less than an hour's flight from Melbourne on mainland Australia.

With more than 20 per cent of the island being National Park or World Heritage listed, Tassie is the perfect mix of land meets sea. Rugged mountain ranges and ancient forests spill out onto pristine beaches. The island also boasts summer rock concerts, the biggest winter festival in Australia, and a unique art and cafe scene.

Not only do we have some of the world's cleanest air and water, we also have more artists and marine scientists per capita than any other state, making Hobart a major hub for scientific research.

Ours is the only university on the island, with campuses in the main metropolis areas of Hobart (the capital) and, Launceston. As the only university in the state, we have a strong set of course offerings. Studying with us, you'll learn alongside the unique people and places of Tasmania.

A semester or two at the University of Tasmania will provide you with an inspirational and diverse study experience, one that will enrich you academically, socially, culturally and environmentally.



Student Exchange program

You can apply to be an exchange student if you're enrolled at one of the University of Tasmania's international exchange partners, and you're nominated by your home university.

Study abroad program

If your home university doesn't have an exchange agreement, you can apply to be a study-abroad student. This also applies if your university is one of our student exchange partners, but you have not secured an exchange place.

The English Language Centre

Want to improve your English Language skills? You can study an English Language program with us before your exchange or study abroad program.

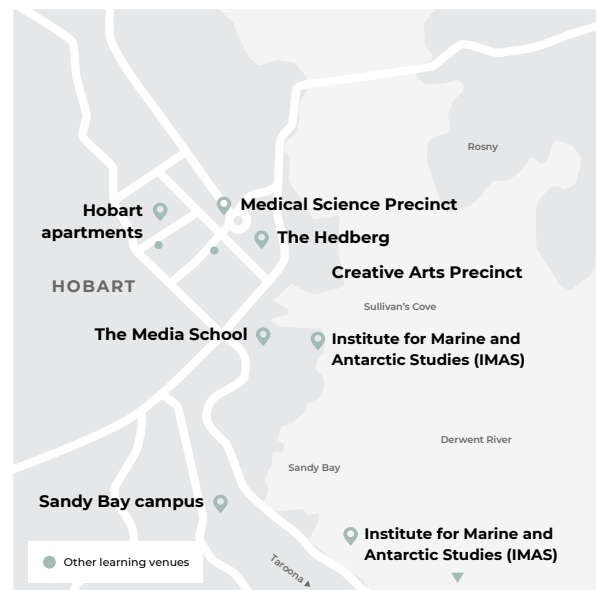

Discover Launceston

Nestled amongst rolling hills surrounding the Kanamaluka / Tamar River, Launceston is an accessible and friendly city, only minutes away from outdoor adventures.

Hike, climb, abseil or swim the day away at the dazzling Cataract Gorge, a spectacular rock valley formation five minutes from the city centre. Cataract Gorge shelters an army of peacocks, cafes nestled in lush hydrangea gardens, and the longest single-span chairlift in the world!

If you enjoy wildlife spotting or are in the mood for an adrenaline rush, you'll love Launceston's proximity to the snowy slopes of Ben Lomond National Park. There's also world-class mountain biking at Blue Derby and wombat-spotting at Cradle Mountain, all within a couple of hours from the city.

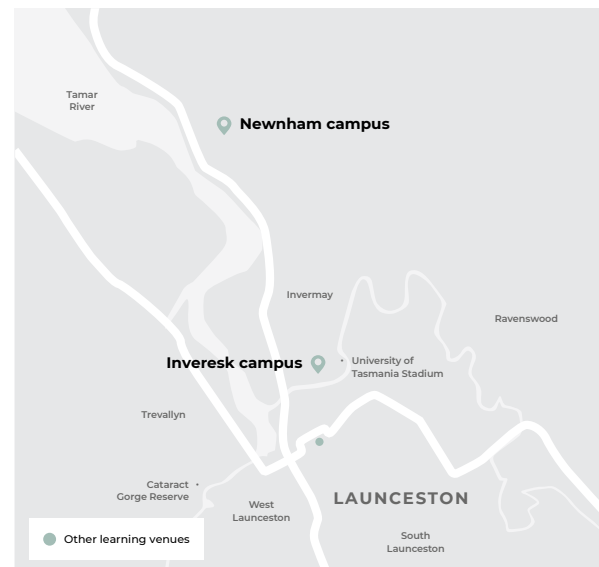

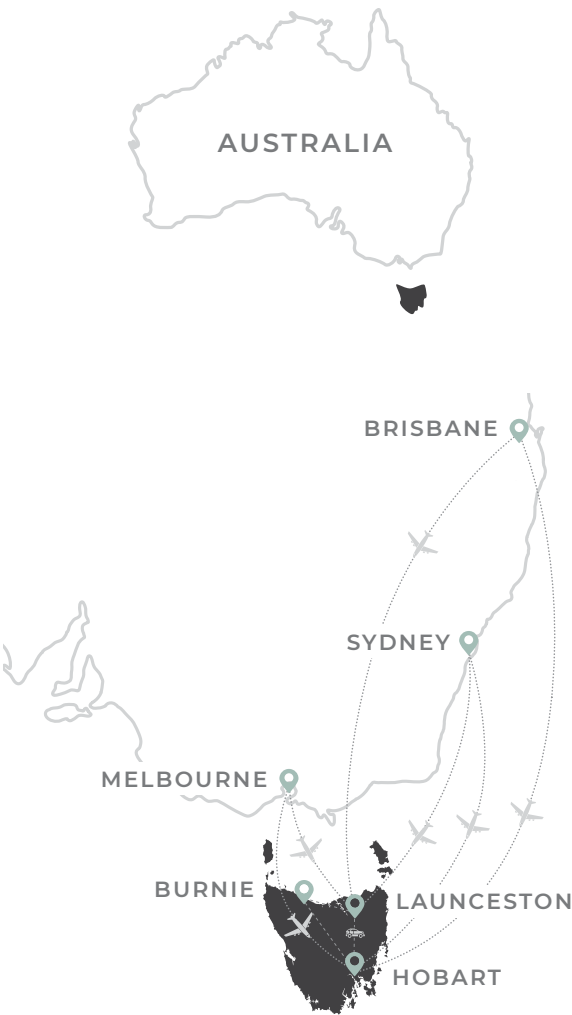

Study areas

Understanding University of Tasmania Unit Codes

KSA307 = Antarctic Ecology

KSA = Discipline Area (Ecology)

3 = Year Level (third year unit)

Units that start with a 4, 5, 6, or 7 are postgraduate level units, for students studying a Masters degree.

Courses are built from a combination of units (or subjects). Each unit has a 'credit point' value (which is usually 12.5), and full time study is 50 credit points per semester, and 100 credit points per year.

To gain credit at your home university for our units, speak to your academic advisor.

You can explore the available study areas at the end of this guide.

Understanding Semesters

Most units run in a Semester structure, which are 13 weeks of teaching and 4 weeks of exams with a mid-semester study break.

Semester 1: February to July

Semester 2: July to November

SPE301 Sustainability Placement

Immerse yourself in real-world sustainability. Lead a project in a Tasmanian industry or community organisation. Gain hands-on experience, build a valuable network, and enhance your employability. Whether your passion is environmental conservation, social justice, or sustainable business, this unit empowers you to foster meaningful solutions for a sustainable world.

Students engage in 80 hours or 11 days (1 day per week) of applied placement activity. While a majority of learning occurs within work-based settings – Workshop and teaching activities accompany the placement, underpinned by sustainability principles.

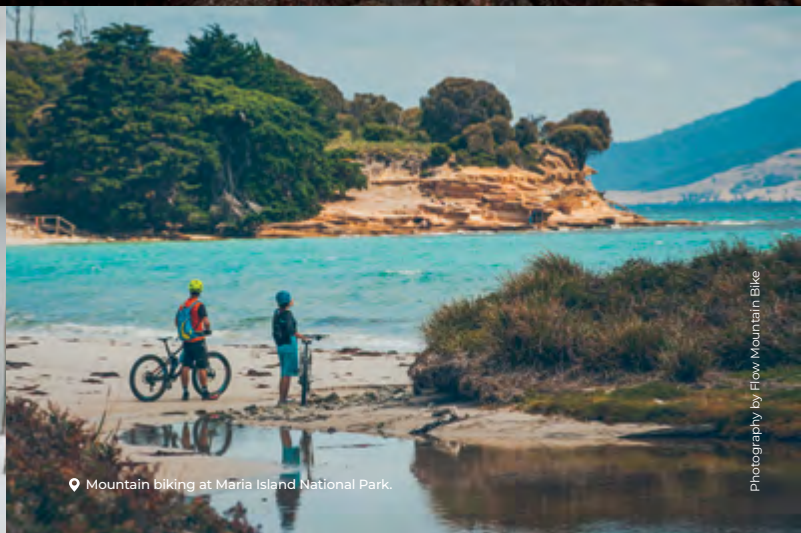
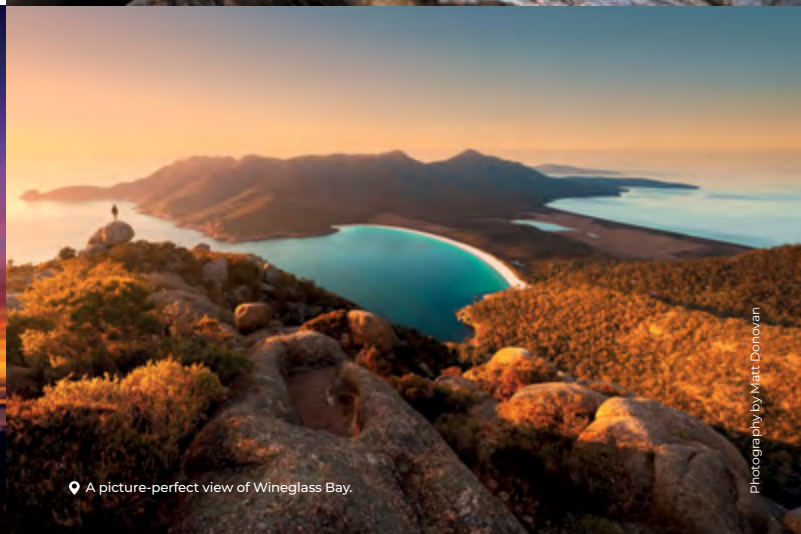
This unit is open to students from any degree and is available at either Hobart or Launceston in both semester 1 and semester 2.

Cost of living

2025 Study Abroad Fees are as follows:

- \$12,500AUD for 4 units
(maximum enrolment per semester)*
- \$9,375AUD for 3 units
(minimum enrolment per semester)*

Additional Exchange and Study Abroad costs

All incoming students must have sufficient funds to cover the cost of:

- Accommodation
- Flights
- General cost of living
- Student visa application fee
- Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

All students must have an approved OSHC policy. The University of Tasmania provides cover through Medibank Private. This will cover the full length of your student visa. The current rates for OSHC will be included in your Letter of Offer.

Living expenses

The following is a rough guide to living costs for international students living in Tasmania (in Australian dollars). Of course, these will vary depending on your preferred standard of living and where you choose to live.

- Groceries and eating out: \$120–\$280 per week.
- Electricity and utilities: \$35–\$140 per week.
- Phone and Internet: \$30–\$55 per week.
- Public transport: \$15–\$55 per week.
- Entertainment, sport, personal care: \$60–\$150 per week.
- Study expenses (lab equipment, field trip expenses etc.): approx. \$1,000 per annum

Accommodation

- Hostels and guesthouses: \$250 to \$350 per week
- Shared private rental: \$130 to \$220 per week
- Single private rental: \$175 to \$300 per week
- University of Tasmania on-campus: \$240 to \$380 per week

Accommodation options

You need to make your own arrangements for accommodation and ensure you have somewhere to stay when you first arrive in Tasmania.

If you want to apply for on-campus accommodation, you should do this as early as possible — at least three months before you arrive. If you're interested in shared or private rental housing, it's usually better to wait until you arrive in Tasmania. However, you should have some temporary accommodation arranged for your arrival.
