HAMILTON

Hamilton is New Zealand's fourth largest city and the perfect launching point for exploring the North Island.

Central location

Hamilton is well positioned near the centre of the North Island. It's close to New Zealand's biggest city, Auckland, as well as beautiful beaches, native forests, and snowy mountains.

Affordable cost of living

CREDIT POINTS

A typical full-time workload at Waikato is 60 credit points per trimester. This usually equates to 4 papers, as most are worth 15 points.

Minimum enrolment is 45 points and maximum is 60 points per trimester.

In general, 15 Waikato points = 3 or 4 US credits, or 7.5 ECTS, but please seek further guidance from your home university.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Gain real-world work experience by interning, researching, or volunteering while studying abroad at the University of Waikato.

Study abroad and exchange students have the exciting opportunity to expand professional and academic networks by working in a New Zealand organisation, all while applying class learnings to real-life situations. The academic credit for the internship or research project is included in the tuition component of your studies.

STUDY + INTERN

Looking for international work experience? The Study + Intern programme allows you to work with a local organisation on a specialised project and gain valuable experience in your field of study. You'll acquire practical skills, and enhance your employability, both at home and in New Zealand. Open to all majors and both study abroad and exchange students can apply.

Entry Requirements:

 You will need to be in your third year or higher of university studies and have some knowledge of your chosen internship subject area.

Programme Highlights:

- Some subjects have the option for academic credit to be earned, ask our advisors what your options are (15 points, third year level)

STUDY + RESEARCH

Want to apply your science knowledge to hands-on research and learning? Experience a science research environment, hone your ability to conduct research, all while learning from subject experts.

Programme Highlights:

- Papers: SCIEN 301 (group) or 313 (individual): Undergraduate Research Project (15 points)
- B trimester only (Fall)
- Several projects to choose from (group) and in some cases the flexibility to choose your own research topic (individual)
- Integrate and synthesise prior knowledge and learning, while working effectively in a team environment to contribute to a substantive project
- Work with world-renowned faculty in areas of animal behaviour, chemistry, coastal processes, earth sciences, ecology and biodiversity, environmental sciences, hydrology, and more.

Entry Requirements:

- Science student in your third year or higher
- Some research projects may require specific knowledge or experience with instruments or research methods.

STUDY + VOLUNTEER

Contribute to the Waikato Region all while gaining work-ready skills through volunteer activity, university participation, and workshop attendance. The University of Waikato Employability Plus Programme (EPP) gives students the opportunity to work with partner organisations or contribute to campus events.

ENGLISH + STUDY ABROAD

Students who don't quite meet our English language entry requirements for study abroad are encouraged to enrol in our English + Study Abroad programme.

Improve your English by enrolling in an English language programme at The University of Waikato College in order to meet entry requirements for our trimester Study Abroad Programme. Eight to ten weeks of study (one block) is equivalent to a 0.5 increase in IELTS level. Discounts may apply to the English language aspect of the English + Study Abroad programme. Please note, this programme is only available to students who are fee-paying trimester study abroad students. Exchange students are unable to participate due to visa restrictions.

Waitomo Glow Worm Caves

Noho Marae



Students take part in cultural activities and eat a traditional hāngi (meal cooked underground) during this unique and special experience.

HAMILTON ACCOMMODATION

College Hall

College Hall is the largest hall and most recently renovated. It has modern lounges on each floor for study and leisure. It's close to the schools of Management, Education, and Law, as well as the swimming pool and sports courts.



Student Village

Student Village is unique in that students live in pods of six residents meaning your pod becomes like your family while you're in the hall. It is located closest to the schools of Arts and Sciences, UniRec gym, Student Centre, and Village Green.



Bryant Hall

Bryant Hall is the smallest hall, creating a tight-knit community of residents and staff who all look out for each other and are focused on balancing study and the student lifestyle. It's close to the schools of Arts and Sciences, UniRec gym, Student Centre, and Village Green.



Silverdale Apartments

Perfect for a more independent student who is after privacy with the convenience of living on campus. These apartments are equipped with a kitchen, bathroom, queen bed and a living/study space. Students can also access the nearby shared facilities at Orchard Park including; TV room, pool table, table tennis and BBQ area.



Orchard Park

Orchard Park is designed for students who want to live in a flatting situation with a good balance between meeting new people and being independent, while enjoying the security of being on campus. All rooms at Orchard Park are self-catered. Each cottage has its own living, dining and kitchen areas, and there is a recreation room for all residents to use. Orchard Park is popular with second to fourth year students, international and postgraduate students.



TAURANGA ACCOMMODATION

Selwyn Street Studios

Our newly-built studios are located just a 5-minute walk from our Tauranga Campus. Students enjoy views over the harbour and the privacy of their own en-suite bathroom. Rooms also include a king single bed, desk, chair, bookshelf, wardrobe, mini fridge and there's free Wi-Fi. This complex is self-catered.

HOW DO I APPLY?

APPLICATION PROCESS

Our application process is easy and straightforward. Talk with your home university's study abroad office first to make sure you meet their requirements and deadlines.

Requirements:

- Online application form
- Paper selection
- Official transcript
- Passport copy
- Proof of English language proficiency (if applicable)

APPLICATION DEADLINES

Check with your home university, as they likely have an earlier internal application deadline. Deadlines applicable to the applications for Enrolling, Accommodation, and the Study + Intern Programme.

- A Trimester (February June): December 1
- B Trimester (July November): May 1



ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

- Minimum B grade average: equivalents vary by country
- English proficiency (if applicable): some faculties have higher requirements; read more: waikato.ac.nz/study/ enrolment/undergraduate-international IELTS: 6.0 overall (or equivalent)
- Completed at least two trimesters/semesters at your home university.

CALENDAR

New Zealand follows a southern hemisphere academic year. The year begins in February and ends in November. It is possible to enrol in A (February) or B (July) trimesters, as well as the yearlong programme.

- A Trimester: late February late June
- B Trimester: early July early November

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS **CODE OF PRACTICE**

COSTS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

COST

Exchange students are not required to pay tuition, as this is paid to your home university. Study abroad students pay a fixed study abroad fee that includes student fees, official transcript, and tuition for papers to a maximum of 60 credit points. The study abroad fee does not include the costs of field trips, textbooks, travel, or accommodation.

TRIMESTER COSTS

Study abroad fee: NZ\$13,125

Student health insurance: NZ\$375

(All international students are required by New Zealand law to purchase student health insurance).


