

Live in Vietnam

Living and studying in Vietnam will you give an opportunity to explore a unique, historic, exotic, and rapidly developing country.

For culture, food, and dramatic scenery Vietnam has it all. You will be coming to a country rich with history and culture. From the ancient town of Hoi An, to the historical ruins of the Cham dynasty, the beaches of central Vietnam, and UNESCO world heritage site Ha Long Bay. Vietnam will surprise you with its diversity.

Ho Chi Minh City

Formerly known as Saigon, this fast-moving, ever-growing modern city is the economic centre of Vietnam, and is populated by approximately 9 million people. In January 2017, Ho Chi Minh City was named as the world's second most dynamic city.

The city is open 24-7, and is home to many cafes and restaurants serving food from all around the world. But beyond that are glimpses of history and cultural attractions including the Opera House, French colonial-style hotels, museums and galleries, Ben Thanh Market and a day tour to Mekong Delta area.

Hanoi City

Culture and history are the key aspects of this 1000 years-old city. Walk the narrow historic streets of the Old Quarter, with shops selling everything from red candlesticks, to lacquerware and water puppets. Take in the sights and sounds around Hoan Kiem Lake, the focal point of Hanoi life, especially on weekends. Ngoc Son Temple was built in the 18th Century and is located in the centre of the lake, on a small island.



Option 2

Choose a GAP Year package

Suitable for students who have just finished senior secondary school and have not yet started undergraduate studies.

- It is recommended to select a few back-up courses in case there are issues with availability or timetabling clashes.

Apply at RMIT

Check that you meet the program's entry requirements.

- Have completed a senior secondary school qualification (equivalent to Australian Year 12) with a minimum average of 65%
- Meet RMIT's English language requirements: bit.ly/englishrequirement
- Be 18 years of age or over at time of application





RMIT Creds

RMIT Creds are a suite of micro-credentials that help develop your skill set beyond your area of study. These credentials have been co-designed with industry to ensure you're ready for the changing world of work. They cover subjects such as digital literacy, leadership, sustainability, innovation, collaboration and communication.

Most Creds are available online and are short in duration, ranging from 60-minute snippets to several hours of learning. After you complete a Cred, you can claim a digital badge, which is a verified certification and a great way to communicate your achievements. You publish and manage your badge using Credly, RMIT's credentialling platform partner. From there you can share your badge with peers, clients, employers or on social networks such as LinkedIn.

Work-integrated learning (WIL)

WIL is an activity where you apply your academic learning in a real-life situation with an industry or community partner.

Higher education and vocational education students can complete a WIL activity, which is formally assessed for credit towards your qualification. The type of WIL activities you undertake will depend on your program and study discipline, and can occur on or off campus. They may be:

- work placements such as clinical placements, internships or field education or professional practices
- projects with industry and community-based organisations
- art projects with exhibitions

Check you meet the entry requirements

You must:

- have completed at least one full year of studies at your home institution.
 (GAP Year applicants are not required to have previous higher education studies)
- have a minimum cumulative Grade Point Average of 2.0 out of 4 or 60% average (or equivalent).
- meet RMIT's English language requirements bit.ly/englishrequirement
- be 18 years of age or over at time of application.


